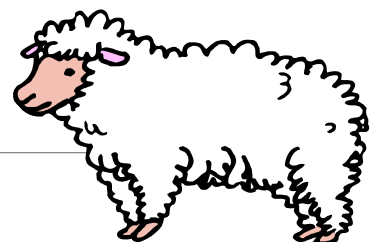
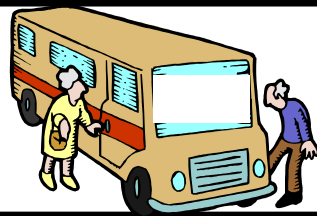
ine leather and had a bow on top. They looked lovely on the little girl's feet.

MARCH POTLUCK

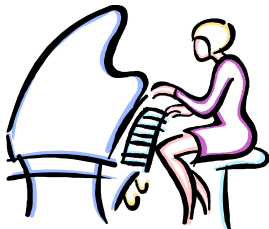
March 29th

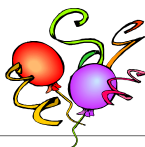
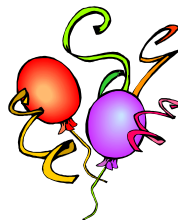
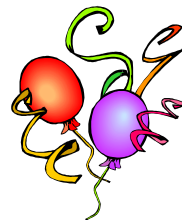
We’ll also take a tour through the Amish countryside before heading to the magnificent Sight & Sound Theater, where we will be awed by “Joseph, The Musical.”

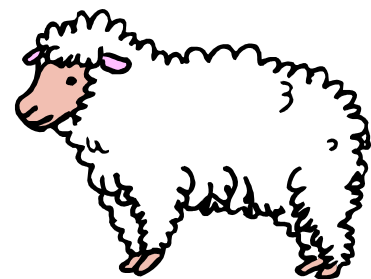
